Hillsborough Kiwanis Club: Serving the Community

The Hillsborough Kiwanis Club is part of an immense network of clubs known as Kiwanis International. In 80 nations, Kiwanis clubs are dedicated to helping their communities in countless ways. Each community's needs are different; so each Kiwanis club is different. The Hillsborough Kiwanis has been serving the youth and seniors of our community since its charter in 1946.

By working together, members achieve what one person cannot accomplish alone. For many years our local club operated without a centre, but in 1994, Kiwanis built the Hank Braam Kiwanis Centre to fill an identified need in the community. The building hosts many successful events every year, including fundraisers for the Kiwanis and other community organizations. As well, it provides a large venue for music shows, weddings and community events.

The Kiwanis Club provides free use of the building for the Boys and Girls Club and Tae Kwon Do. In 2015, the centre was used 142 nights for these.

The community centre is the main focus of the club but you don't have to go far to see where else the organization's fundraising skills are used. Kiwanis funds supplied the glass panels and heaters in the stands at the Hillsborough arena. In 1984, the club built the Kiwanis Seniors' Lodge in response to a need for local housing. By offering much needed affordable and comfortable accommodations, the complex has enabled many seniors to remain in their community.

The club provides yearly donations to organizations like Minor Hockey, Fundy Blades, Elementary School Grade 5 breakfast, Kiwanis Seniors Lodge, Forest Dale Home, and the CRHS graduation bursary & watch award.

Each spring and fall, Kiwanis sends two area high school youth to the Key Leader Trainer seminar hosted by Kiwanis International in Gagetown. The three-day seminar provides the opportunity to learn leadership skills to help them participate in changing their school, community and the world...all for the better.

The Kiwanis Club meets on Thursday nights. Members operate the canteen at the rink and host the weekly bingo at the centre. Members participate in many worthwhile causes, but it is not all work. They host special member events that are pure fun, like the annual Cribbage Tournament and Christmas party. The Kiwanis is a great local and international organization that comes with its own rewards. Community Groups Save Acadian Forest

The Elgin Eco Association and the Nature Trust of New Brunswick have conserved 160 acres of beautiful Acadian forest in Elgin, New Brunswick. Through an effective partnership, the two organizations, with the help of many supporters, were able to establish a nature preserve before the historic forest was scheduled to be clear-cut. The local Elgin Eco Association will continue to steward this preserve – the Mapleton Acadian Forest Nature Preserve — for years to come.

The 160-acre property features over three km of trails that span the length of the preserve. With footbridges, a traditional sugar shack and interpretive signs, the Elgin Eco Association have been proud stewards of the important Acadian forest since the official creation of the organization in 2002. When the property was sold for clear-cutting, the Elgin Eco Association approached the Nature Trust to partner on conserving the land and trail. After months of campaigns and fundraising, the Mapleton Acadian Forest Nature Preserve was officially protected in December 2016.

“The Elgin Eco Association would like to thank all the members and individuals that so generously supported our cause. You believed in us,” says Moranda Van Geest, Elgin Eco Association President.

The Mapleton Acadian Forest Nature Preserve features two brooks, new and old growth forest, ravines, and an ecologically sensitive area comprised of giant hemlocks. The preserve is a true Acadian Forest, with a mix of a variety of hard and soft wood trees including eastern cedar, red spruce, yellow birch and red maple. The Acadian forest is classified as an endangered forest type in North

America, with less than five percent of pre-settlement area of intact Acadian forest remaining. The preserve is also home to many plant and bird species characteristic of the Acadian forest, such as the northern flying squirrel. The chimney swift, a threatened species due to habitat loss, has also been sighted in the preserve. The Nature Trust of New Brunswick is excited about the new partnership with the Elgin Eco Association.

“We look forward to our continued collaboration with the Elgin Eco Association, as they will continue to steward the property for the community to enjoy,” says Renata Woodward, Executive Director of the Nature Trust of New Brunswick. “We are also interested to speak with any landowner who is willing to work on land conservation surrounding this preserve.”

The Elgin Eco Association and the Nature Trust of New Brunswick will host an opening ceremony for the nature preserve in August 2017. A huge thank you to those who contributed to the protection of the Mapleton Acadian Forest Nature Preserve, including major funders: Mountain Equipment Co-Op, The New Brunswick Wildlife Trust Fund, Environment and Climate Change Canada and the Nature Conservancy of Canada through their Other Qualified Organizations Program.

Focus Forward: A 15-week free program

Focus Forward is an amazing an amazing 15-week free program offered in Riverside-Albert. The program helps people identify their skills and strengths. For example, if you like cooking... maybe you can get a job in a kitchen. Maybe you like taking care of people...homecare could be the job for you.

It can be hard getting back into the work force. You may have left a job years ago because you wanted to raise children, or you had health problems. Now, years later, you don't know how to use a computer and maybe feel like there is nothing you can do – no skills you can offer in a job.

In a past session, a participant hadn't worked in years – or so she thought. She didn't have a job but she had worked in many unpaid ways. She couldn't use a computer but had many other skills. By the end of the 15-week course, she felt better about herself and was using the computer daily. When her family came out for the graduation, the woman explained she had “never stuck with anything before.” Now, with more skills, greater self-confidence and a new network of friends and fellow students, she is closer to getting back into the job market.

Focus Forward

What is it? The program helps people develop practical skills that can help them find and keep jobs. Participants learn useful skills, develop their self-confidence and have fun. The program gives participants valuable life skills along with a sense of community.

Who can join? Anyone over the age of 19. Past participants have ranged in age from 19 to 75 years old. Some people are looking for work for the first time – others want to change careers. Some participants are dealing with disabilities or different learning abilities; others simply need to ease their way back into the workforce.

When is it? The 15-week course starts on Monday, February 13th (but it is possible to sign up later). The group meets from 9:30 in the morning to 2:00 in the afternoon Monday to Thursday (with a break for lunch).

What happens? People start off with games to get their minds “fired.” They watch short videos and discuss the topics. The groups are small (the last session had nine people). The content is flexible and changes to meet the needs of the group. Some might want to learn about working a cash register; others might want to talk about working in the woods. They discuss local issues and what matters to them. For example, the last group wanted to learn more about healthy eating so the dietician from the health centre talked with them one day. Connecting Albert County's website is often used so people can learn how to use the internet while reading about their own community.

What skills do I need? None – just a willingness to learn. Some people have never used computers before they start the course. Participants have various levels of math and reading skills.

Where is it? Downstairs at the Albert County Health and Wellness Centre in Riverside-Albert.

Who teaches the course? Catherine Rhyno, who now lives in Alma, teaches the group. She used to work as an interior designer and then started teaching design. After getting her B.Ed., she started to teach essential skills in Saint John.

Who funds the program? The course is free for participants. Funding comes from NB Post-Secondary Education, Training & Labour, the NB Association of Community Living, and Key Industries. The Albert County Health and Wellness Centre provides the room. The Bennett and Albert County Health Care (BACH) Foundation has provided the multi-media equipment and furnished the Community Health Room (see page 6).

Albert County Community Health Room

If you look through the Connecting Albert County calendar, you will often see references to the Community Room or Community Health Room. The room is on the lower level of the Albert County Health and Wellness Centre in Riverside-Albert. In case you have never been there, we thought it was time to introduce you to the Community Health Room – a valuable resource in our area.

The room is available for free for community groups. If you need a place to hold a meeting or even a full-day workshop, call 882-3100. If the room is available, you can book it at no cost. In addition to community meetings, the room is used for

programs, such as Focus Forward (see page 3), support groups, workshops on health-related topics, as well as innovative medical telecommunications.

The Bennett and Albert County Health Care (BACH) Foundation has furnished the room with various audiovisual technology. You can use the basic flipchart and white boards, or project images from your laptop to a screen or television monitor.

Videoconferencing is also possible – this allows for live communication between different locations. People can hear and see each other on the television screen. Meetings and workshops can be held with var-

ious groups of people in several different places at once. The technology also allows patients to be in the room in Riverside-Albert and connect with medical specialists from other provinces – a long-distance medical appointment without the long drive. Medical staff can supplement their training by attending workshops long-distance by videoconference.

Hon. RB Bennett, the only Canadian Prime Minister to come from New Brunswick.
