This spring has felt like a rollercoaster in Albert County—and no, I'm not talking about the roads. We were teased by lovely warm, sunny days followed by snow and sub-zero temperatures well into April. It feels almost surreal to say that spring has finally arrived.

For many Albert County businesses, spring means opening up the doors and sliding back into routine after a long winter. The Hopewell Rocks will open their gates at 9am on Friday, May 17th. Others are open yearround, such as Broadleaf Accommodations and Horseback Adventures—it's just the view that changes!

If you're anything like me, food will be the driving force behind your Albert County explorations. Stay tuned for extended summer hours at Rocco's Cucina for authentic Italian cuisine in Hillsborough. At Broadleaf Ranch Restaurant, brunch is served every Sunday (10am-2pm) from Mother's Day until Thanksgiving. The restaurant will open full-time late May. Further down Route 114 is An Octopus' Garden Café in Alma. They open in May and will serve mouthwatering dishes made as always with local ingredients. An added bonus is the opportunity to browse local art

while you're at An Octopus' Garden Café. Admire the creations of Tim Isaac Pottery and other featured artists. This season, the Friends of Fundy/Fundy Guild will work with Fine Arts interns from Mount Allison University to turn the second floor of the café into a mini- gallery and studio space for local artists.

Glass Roots Inc. opened a gallery at 406 Coverdale Rd. in Riverview (open Tues.- Sun. but daily as of June). The glassblowing studio (1195 Rte 915, New Horton) is open for demos and workshops by appointment year-round, and open daily July and August.

If you have family or friends looking for a place to stay, there are many options. Falcon Ridge Inn B&B in Alma continues to be open daily. Fundy Highlands Motel & Chalets will open their chalets as May 1st. The motel opens on the Victoria Day weekend.

The bottom line is simple—Albert County is an exceptional place to eat, sleep and explore in every season, but there is just something special about spring. Ride the high of longer days and warmer temperatures, support local businesses, and remember how lucky we are to live in Albert County.

# Local Food & Eco-Friendly Products at Hopewell Rocks Story and picture by Paul Gaudet

Spring has fully engaged (or at least I hope so by the time you read this) and we, at Hopewell Rocks, are reawakening our site for the coming season which starts Friday, May 17th at 9am. Look for our spring and autumn food-bank days when we collect dry goods or a monetary donation for the Shepody Food Bank in lieu of paying admission fees. These dates will be announced in the next month or so.

As you may know, the Hopewell Rocks have had three consecutive banner years; in fact, they have been the three busiest years, in terms of visitation, in our history. As these numbers (hovering around 300,000 visits per year) are expected to remain constant or perhaps even grow, we have been trying to be as eco-friendly as we can. It is not always easy with these huge numbers of guests, but we have been making inroads.

In terms of local food, Jeff Arseneault, our restaurant and café manager, uses local beef, lobster, maple syrup, sausages, buns, ice cream, french fries, and dairy products, along with local beer

and wine. Jeff is always looking for more products that can be obtained locally (providing they meet his needs for quality and supply).

In terms of eco- friendly products, Jeff will use paper straws in the dining area, as well as bamboo cutlery and biodegradable containers for take-out orders.

The maintenance department has a system to catch rainwater to use for washing vehicles, watering plants, etc.

They separate trash (many sites, sadly, do not) and recover the recyclables; money is donated to local school breakfast programs. Everyone on-site picks up and disposes of any trash they find during their daily duties.


We have two vehicle-charging devices on our property for our guests to use to charge electric cars. We don't allow coaches to idle while waiting for their passengers. When trees fall or have to be cut, the wood is cut and used for firewood by the lucky staff person whose name is drawn out of a hat.



In terms of looking after the flora and fauna, our interpreters and park gardener/botanist Crystal McCormack do their thing by protecting the sandpipers, peregrines and other animals they encounter in the park, and looking after all the plants, trees and shrubs.

I hope that I have given you a bit of an insight in to what we try to do here at our amazing tourism site. We are by no means perfect, but we are trying and hope to get even better at making our site more eco-friendly as the years pass. We would like to set a good example through our efforts as we strive to be good stewards of our impressive piece of the natural world while being proponents of sustainable tourism. May we all have a warm, sunny (with just enough rain) spring and summer season in this beautiful county that we call home.

We are blessed here in Albert County! We have fresh air to breathe, ample beautiful spaces to enjoy, and nature's therapy available to us at any given time. Through every season, we find ways to get outside and make the most of it.

We are an officially designated part of the Fundy Biosphere Reserve. Our little part of the world, God's Country as I've often been told, is ours to cherish, enjoy and preserve. This also makes it our responsibility!

We already have to sort our garbage. Now we have to pay a carbon tax. Isn't that enough? No, it isn't.

There are so many things we can do in our homes and at work to make sure that we all do our part. I'm certainly learning and making adjustments in my life. It's not a new concept by any means, but it's as good a time as any to do more. I've travelled to places, as you certainly may have, and seen the damage, the neglect and the abuse to precious coastlines and heritage sites. We don't ever want the place we call home to be in that condition.

I've been placed with an absolute gem in my hands as Managing Director of Fundy's Cape Enrage: environmental responsibility is something I cannot ignore. Luckily, we have some great influencers in our area that I've been able to reach out to. I worked for years at Hopewell Rocks where Noel Hamman, the Property Manager, strongly supports the self-appointed environmentally-friendly Green Team. These staff members practice green initiatives daily with ecofriendly dishware, rainwater collection, recycling, etc. (See previous page for details.)

I've recently met with Phyllis and Kirk Sutherland, owners of Ponderosa Pines Campground, who are very well-known in our area for their decades of conservation efforts! They were more than happy to sit with me, over a nice cup of coffee in their home, to share best practices and identify key people to connect with.

The past and present employees at Cape Enrage have been doing many things as part of a Zero Waste Initiative. As a leader, it's my role to encourage and

enable as many practices as possible so we all get on the same page. We have composting on-site and we are creating our own garden to supply fresh herbs and vegetables to our restaurant kitchen (initially implemented by innovative former Chef Jeremy Wilbur, whose values are shared by current Executive Chef Slawek Dobrzynski).

We will step up our garbage dividing to include cardboard and newspaper recycling. We collect rainwater.

At the Cape House Restaurant, stainless steel straws will be used, along with a transition to eco-friendly to-go containers. We reuse office printing paper, solar panels are

included in any enhancement plan, and we continue to promote local foods and suppliers, etc. These, on their own, are small steps, but have a larger impact. Can you imagine ever making it up that last climb of Cape Enrage Road to see the site in disrepair or polluted?

# Spring in Fundy National Park

One of the most welcome aspects of spring is all the extra daylight for spending time outside and in nature. What better place to take advantage of those extra daylight hours than a national park?

A park of rivers, Fundy is a great place to feel the power of nature as the Point Wolfe and Upper Salmon rivers race to meet the Bay. Springtime rivers have much higher water levels and flow much faster than usual, so make sure to practice caution as you explore. Higher water levels make waterfalls even more spectacular than usual this time of year. Add Dickson Falls to your May bucket list!


With the snow melted, some wildlife such as whitetail deer will become much more active, feasting on all the springtime shoots. Snowshoe hares will begin to shed their white winter coat in favour of the brown colours of summer. Bird numbers also increase this time of year, with many native species returning north from their winter homes. Listen for Spring Peepers and other frog species during your hike on Caribou Plain trail.

Make sure to check with Park staff at the Visitor Centre or call 887-6000 for trail conditions and information on road closures.

A "B Corp" is a company that has been certified by B Lab®, a nonprofit focused on promoting ethical business practices. Think fair trade certification for coffee or organic certification for bananas, but for the whole business. B Corps can exist in any industry or field, if the business can meet certain criteria for demonstrating sufficiently positive business practices in five areas: Governance, Workers, Community, Environment, and Customers. Certification is based on answering a series of questions in each of the five areas that affirms the business is considering its impact on all stakeholder groups.

Each year, more financial companies make the list. Although none of the big banks have managed to obtain certification to date, several credit unions have.

"Being a purpose-led business is more than hanging a set of values on the wall or writing them in an employee handbook; it's about living them each day throughout our entire organization. As we continue to plan and think about where OMISTA will be in the future, we think about the impact we want to make on our community and the environment and what employees, customers and investors want to see from us," says Trisha Leaver.

### **Supporting Seniors Community Involvement in Albert County**

#### April 23, 2019: Albert County, NB Employment and Social Development Canada Press Release

Organizations across Fundy Royal are creating opportunities for seniors to continue to make significant and valuable contributions to their families, communities and country. However, there can be barriers for seniors to access these programs and opportunities. The Albert County Museum and Tele-Drive Albert County recognized these issues in the Albert County area and are working together to ensure seniors in the area can access their programming.

Alaina Lockhart, Member of Parliament for Fundy Royal, on behalf of the Honourable Filomena Tassi, Minister of Seniors, announced funding for two New Horizon for Seniors Program (NHSP) community-based projects in Albert County.

The Albert County Museum is receiving \$4,924 to purchase equipment to increase and invigorate their exhibits to allow seniors to help with the exhibit expansion by sharing their knowledge and conducting research.

Tele-Drive Albert County is receiving \$20,000 to provide transportation for seniors to attend workshops, computer courses, yoga classes, and transportation to the Albert County Museum to promote social participation of seniors. These two organizations are helping seniors stay active and involved in their community.

# Safe, Affordable Housing for Rural Albert County By Roy Ries

In 2016, the Albert County Community Health Needs Assessment identified a list of ten community issues that needed to be addressed. One was the need for more safe, affordable housing.

During the spring of 2017, the Safe Affordable Housing Committee was formed. The committee is made up of the mayors of Riverside-Albert, Alma and Hillsborough, Roy Ries from the Chipoudy Communities Revitalization Committee (CCRC), Joe Gallant, Community Developer, and Phyllis Hudson, Manager of the Albert County Community Health Centre.

The objective of our group was to assess the needs for housing and to recommend a strategy to meet these needs. We met with representatives from a wide variety of government departments and non-governmental organizations that are involved with housing. These meetings were designed to familiarize us with past and current programs related to housing development. In addition, we created a Housing Needs Assessment Survey and mailed it to more than 1000 households from Hillsborough to Alma in May 2018. CCRC and the Bennett and Albert County Health Care (BACH) Foundation funded the survey.

In October 2018, we presented the survey results at a public meeting at Forest Dale Home. The results indi-

cate that there is a definite need for a variety of types of housing. We presented the survey results to the three municipal councils and our MP, Alaina Lockhart, who expressed enthusiasm and provided information on the new Canadian Housing Program. We have also been in touch with a private individual who had expressed interest in the development of housing in our area.

We have applied for a grant from the Canadian Mortgage and Housing Corporation SEED Program. If approved, the grant will provide funds for the preparation of a detailed "Pre-Development Plan" that defines the type and quantity of housing to be built, the project management plan, and the financial plan. The CCRC has also provided funding for this planning process.

On May 28, 2019, the Safe Affordable Housing Committee will host a Community Meeting at 7pm at the Riverside-Albert Recreation Centre to present its recommendations for housing development, and gather feedback and suggestions from community members. Other local wellness programs and organizations will be invited to provide information on their activities and services available.

We look forward to seeing you all at this meeting.

The workshop fee of \$45 includes your pattern and fabric to complete a cute cat and mouse wall hanging. Other basic supplies will be required.
