Veterans Memorial Banners

In November 2022 we are pleased and honoured to have the Veterans' Memorial Banners displayed on King Street in Riverside-Albert. In total there are 30 banners being put up to commemorate the service and sacrifice of many of our veterans. Additional banners may be ordered for next year through the Legion in Hillsborough.

Cecil L. Barbour was born in Cape Enrage. He joined the army and served in Germany and Holland during WWII. He lived in Riverside and worked in Fundy National Park.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Collins of Albert had two sons and one daughter in the Canadian Army.

Corporal **Alger R. Collins** joined the Royal Rifles of Canada at the age of 16. He trained in New Brunswick, Ontario and Newfoundland. Alger died in Hong Kong on December 23, 1941 at the age of 18. His mother was a Silver Cross Mother. A letter he wrote home to his mom said, "Don't worry about me because I am now a soldier of Canada."

Weldon C. Collins enlisted and shipped overseas for service in WWII. He was injured in Great Britain and lost his leg as a result. Unfortunately, later in life his other leg had to be amputated. Weldon lived in Moncton.

Lillian B. Collins did her army training in Kitchener, Ontario, and she lived in Moncton, New Brunswick.

James H. Copp served in the army in WWII. When the war memorial was placed at McClelan Park in Riverside, James had the honor of unveiling it.

John F. Corney was born in Prince Edward Island. While living in Moncton with his family, he joined the army in 1941. He served overseas with the Canadian Army.. After the war, he farmed in

Midway and later moved to Riverside. Like many of our vets he still has family in the area.

Walter Michael Doherty was born in New Ireland. His mother died when he was four years old, and he was raised by his father and sister Stella. At the age of 16 he joined the North Shore (New Brunswick) Regiment. His regiment was part of the D-Day invasion in Normandy, France, where Walter and nineteen other Canadian soldiers were captured by the 12th SS Panzer Division under the command of Kurt Meyer. The prisoners were interrogated and one by one taken out to the garden and executed. Kurt Meyer was convicted of war crimes and served ten years at Dorchester Penitentiary. The story of this crime is told in a book, Murder at the Abbaye.

Susan and John Duffy of Germantown had three sons (Vincent, James and Francis) who served in the army during WWII.

Vincent L. Duffy served overseas perhaps as a cook because that is what he did as a civilian. He lived in Hopewell Hill.

James Edward Duffy took his training in Fredericton and served overseas as a Lance Corporal. He lived in Albert. His letters sent home are a valued family possession.

Reginald H. Graves was born in New Ireland and lived in Beaverbrook. He served in the 14th Canadian Field Ambulance and got shrapnel in his leg. He served in Italy and Sicily.

Russell J. Fullerton enlisted in the army in June 1941. He served for three years in Italy with the 1st Canadian Army Tank Brigade (later renamed the 1st Canadian Armoured Brigade). He has family in the area and in Ontario. He lived in Albert.

Corporal **Rupert Haire**, peacekeeper, served in the navy as a sonar man on submarines. He transitioned to the army and served as vehicle technician in Canada and Germany. He lived in Riverside.

Ronald M. Kennie lived in Beaverbrook and joined the Royal Rifles at the age of 16. He died in the Battle of Hong Kong just before the surrender at Christmas in 1941.

Albert H. Lockhart joined the Royal Canadian Air Force and was a mechanic at the base in Debert, Nova Scotia. His son and family live in the area.

Rev. Francis Lockhary was the parish priest in Riverside (1907–1919). He had the Holy Ghost Church built in 1908. He went overseas and served as Chaplain in WWI with the Canadian Army, returning home after the Armistice.

Manus an Jane McKinley of Albert had three sons serving in WWII (Bennie, Mincer and Wilfred).

Bennie McKinley joined the RCAF and served overseas. His plane was shot down and crashed on the beach. The pilot was killed, and he was taken prisoner and served three years in a German prison. Some of his letters sent home still exist.

Joseph McKinley served with the 145th Battalion (New Brunswick) as part of the Canadian Expeditionary Force (CEF) in Britain and France during WWI. He suffered shell gas wounds at Vimy Ridge and spent many months in the hospital. He lived in Riverside.

Emmerson J. Morrissey of Germantown was a member of the Saint John Fusiliers and the Cape Breton Highlanders. He served in England, Holland, France, and Italy. He and his family later lived in Irishtown.



Roy E. Rolfe, the son of a sea captain, was in WWI. He served in France and Italy and was wounded 5 times. He and his family lived in Point Wolfe, Fundy National Park. He moved to Hopewell Hill and donated a large parcel of his farm for the new Catholic Cemetery. He later moved to Riverside.

Charles M. Rossiter joined the Cape Breton Highlanders in 1939. He served in Italy, Germany and France until the end of the war. He lived in Waterside.

Hillyard D. Rossiter joined the Army and trained in Scotland where he met his future wife. He served in Germany and Holland and lived in Beaverbrook.

James C. Russell of Hopewell Hill joined the navy and was a cook aboard the HMCS Calgary K 231 Corvette. The ship was part of a convoy that sank German U-boats. James received many burns while cooking in the rough seas. Like many of our vets, he has family in the area.

Leslie V. Stevens of Memel was in the Canadian Army. He trained in Canada and Scotland. He saw military action in the Netherlands and Germany. He received wounds to his eyes from a shell blast.

Royal G. Taylor served in the 34th (Reserve) Field Regiment that stormed the beaches at Normandy. His granddaughter, Debbie, and her husband live in Riverside.

Douglas F. Tucker joined the army at the age of 16. He served in France and Germany. He lived with his family in Riverside.


Clifford West of Hopewell Hill had two sons who served in the RCAF in WWII:

James W. West was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross. He was a crew member who took part in many of the bombing raids over Germany in WWII. He lived in Riverview and later moved to the family home in Hopewell Hill. Jim had a large collection of antiques and a rare knowledge of the history of the area.

William West trained in radar at various places, including Ireland where he met his wife, Peggy. He became a radar operator and served throughout Europe. He was awarded the British Empire Medal. After the war, he became Regional Director for the Farm Credit Corporation, which provides financial assistance for farmers. He and his family lived in Riverview.

Frank F. Willett served in the Canadian Army and was a dispatch rider with the 12th Field Regiment, Royal Canadian Artillery. He served in France, Germany, Belgium and Holland. He resided in Riverside.

James A. Wilson was an army sergeant in WWI. He served in England, Wales and France and returned home with his bride. They lived in Riverside. **Hugh C. Wright** joined the army at age 19. He served with the CEF's 26th Battalion (New Brunswick) in Belgium and France during WWI. His letters sent home from the battle fields still exist. He was a lighthouse keeper at Grindstone Island.

More than two dozen Albert County folks arrived at the Harvey Hall as the morning skies slowly lifted wet gray clouds in early October on Mary's Point Road in Harvey.

While the 55-cup coffee pot perked, the mouse-blown cups and saucers, counters and utensils had to be sanitized, washed and dried for the morning greet and goodies with tea and coffee. Not an easy task since there's currently no running water or drain, so volunteers rallied camping-style and boiled jug water to do serious housekeeping! As the lunch pots simmered, men and women from all over Albert County arrived throughout the day to lend support and strong backs under the direction of Riverside-Albert's Peter Brzezcki.

Throughout the morning clouds parted, almost symbolically, and the day grew brighter almost equal to the progress made – work shirts were shed as the warming sun comforted those taking a break for lunch - a hot lunch with a buttered roll and sweets was provided thanks to volunteers. Harvey Community Hall printed hoodies were passed out - a volunteer's thank you gift to those who gave up a Saturday to "Haul for Harvey Hall". CTV news shared excellent broadcast news coverage of the day's efforts for the community, by the community, among the community – right there in the name: the Harvey Community Hall 1884. So much is happening, so successfully, and so heartwarmingly – thank you to all.



MEMORIES ON THE BOUNTY

Recently published "Memories on the Bounty" dropped anchor in Hopewell Cape at the Albert County Museum on Thursday, September 29. A crew of nearly forty area seniors and other guests were on deck in the Community Hall for the afternoon presentation with Monctonian writer, Janet Coulter Sanford, who shared her experience of authoring the memoir of longtime friend, Roy Boutilier, and his life altering year aboard the replica of the infamous ship "Bounty".

Roy was just nineteen when, by chance, he joined the "Bounty" in 1960 on its maiden voyage from Lunenburg Harbour, Nova Scotia, to the exotic isle of Tahiti for the MGM film remake of "Mutiny on the Bounty", starring Marlon Brando. "Memories on the Bounty" is "a story of friendship, love, and adventure", an account of Roy's year on the Bounty as recalled over many coffee conversations with the author.

The event was hosted by the Albert County Historical Society as part of the 2021-2022 New Horizons for Seniors Program project. Janet's presentation, interspersed with readings from her debut book, provided the context for the process of interviewing, writing and researching. Of particular interest were the displayed artefacts and memorabilia from Roy's year long Bounty adventure, as well as a scrap book of articles and photos assembled throughout the intervening decades by Roy's wife. This collection proved to be an invaluable resource for Janet.

Book signing, conversation and discussion during the refreshment break were appreciated and enjoyed by all. The programme concluded with Janet's comment on the importance and significance of "Keepers" - be they individuals, organizations or societies. Without the "keepers" of collections - the "savers" of stuff, the stewards of records, and archival sites such as museums - our heritage and history, and thus our sense of person and place, would be lost and writings such as "Memories on the Bounty" would be forever adrift.

Busting Nutrition Myths

Here are 3 common nutrition myths you should stop believing right now:

1. "Natural" sugars such as maple syrup, honey and coconut sugar are better for you than plain white sugar.

To put it simply, sugar is sugar. All sugars are very similar to one another as they are made up of glucose and fructose (sugar molecules) in different ratios. For example, white sugar is made up of 50% glucose and 50% fructose, while maple syrup is made up of 51.5% glucose and 49.5% fructose. Our body cannot tell the difference between white sugar and so called "natural" sugars, it just sees sugar molecules. Although "natural" sugars may contain some trace nutrients, the amounts are so minimal that they do not add up to anything significant (and you shouldn't be eating sugar for the trace nutrients anyway). The bottom line is that "natural" sugars are added sugars, just like plain white sugar, and they should be limited.

2. Sea salt, pink Himalayan salt, or kosher salt is better for you than table salt.

All salts are molecularly very similar, made up of at least 95-98% sodium chloride. The differences in sodium content of the salts are irrelevant in the context of your overall eating pattern, as they are so similar, and the differences really only lie in the size and shape of the grains. A quarter teaspoon of table salt contains about 590 mg of sodium, whereas coarse sea salt contains about 580 mg, kosher salt contains around 480 mg and pink Himalayan salt contains about 460 mg. Pink Himalayan salt is often claimed to be a healthier salt than table salt as it contains trace amounts of nutrients; however, the amounts are so minimal that they are nutritionally irrelevant. Just like sugar, you shouldn't be eating salt for the trace nutrients anyway. The bottom line is that the type of salt used is not important, but the amount used is.

3. A detox diet will clean "toxins" out of the body.

There is little evidence to support the claims that detox diets (or supplements) will help you remove toxins from your body, lose weight or boost your immune system. The fact is you don't need to buy a product or go on a diet to "detoxify" your body, and any weight loss is largely water, which will be easily regained once you start eating normally again. Your body doesn't need any help removing any toxins or waste. Your lungs, gut, liver and kidneys do a good job in removing waste every day. Instead of going on a detox diet, focus on eating more whole foods, drinking more water and enjoying an active lifestyle.



An Open letter in regards to the Elected Officials Advisory Committee that was formed to help in the new Local Government Reform.

We were a committee made up of people from each of the communities affected by the reform, working together to help make sure everything was going well, and to make suggestions that would assist in combining the three municipalities and Local Service District (LSD) regions into one municipality.

Some committee members feel it is important that the people of Entity #42 (Fundy-Albert) know the truth – and that we had absolutely no say in the decisions being made.

Mr. Chad Peters from Moncton was the Facilitator for this committee and he had the right to veto anything that was not a consensus (even when a majority vote had taken place). It was his decision to make and his alone. He was under the direction of Minister Daniel Allain and his colleagues who are in charge of the new Local Government Reform.

We were very frustrated that even the naming process didn't go smoothly. We had decided on a name, but when someone questioned it, Chad changed the name. This was despite a majority vote twice for "Community of Albert" instead of "Fundy-Albert". Community of Albert was intended to protect the history of our Albert County heritage, which,ch was named by Queen Victoria for her husband, Prince Albert.

The first vote was 8 to 1 in favour of the name "Community of Albert". The vote was passed because the dissenting voter was indifferent and agreed to change in favor of the majority.

Then, to our surprise, a new meeting was called because one member who was not present for the initial vote made at the previous meeting had a problem with the name. That person thought the word "Fundy" should be in the name. We suggested adding the slogan "Gateway to Fundy" after the name to include everyone from Lower Coverdale to Alma.

Further discussion and a second vote resulted in another majority at 6-4, with one abstention, for "Community of Albert".. The committee was under the impression that the majority would win, but to our surprise, Mr. Chad Peters indicated that due to no consensus, he would decide. The next thing we knew he had registered the name as Fundy-Albert.

Next, Mr. Chad Peters had taken on the role of contracting a human resources Firm to hire the new Chief Administrative Officer for the new Entity. He thought there may be some conflicts of interest with the committee members from the three village municipalities who might know potential candidates. Due to this, no one from the committee was on the hiring committee.

We were not given any information about the candidates or the successful applicant's qualifications. We would have no information if a community member asked about the hiring process. All we were told was that this HR company, and all the people who looked after the interviews, were very professional. The process was completed with no input at all from the committee.

When we were asked to join this committee we all were under the impression it was to help the new Facilitator get to know what would be best for our new community. However, this was not the case. , So, if any residents of Fundy- Albert have any questions or concerns, they will have to refer to Mr. Chad Peters or Minister Daniel Allain for any information. They have had all the say and it appeared they wanted no input from the committee, regardless of the fact some haved lived in this community for all our lives or have been residents for many years.
