Albert County Area Community Health Assessment: Updates!

↑ lot of work has been taking place to move forward on the priorities of the Community Health Needs Assessment, covering Hillsborough to Alma. Below, you will find the 10 priorities with an update of what is happening under each. Many of the initiatives listed below are supported by the Bennett and Albert County Health Care (BACH) Foundation.

1. The need to improve mental resiliency and coping skills among children and youth in the community.

The schools in Riverside-Albert and Hillsborough have implemented Integrated Service Delivery, an approach that involves close collaboration among team members and the departments of Education and Early Childhood Development, Social Development, Health, Public Safety, school districts and regional health authorities. The program is designed to support children and vouth with emotional, behavioural and mental health issues.

2. The need for Albert County Health and Wellness Centre outreach services in the community of Hillsborough.

The Hillsborough Satellite Office (the "Old Church," 2807 Main Street) currently offers Lab and Specimen drop-off services every Tuesday and Thursday from 8:30am to 11:30am. The Nurse Practitioner now offers primary health care services to patients residing in the greater Hillsborough area (call 882-3100 for details). The Health Centre is exploring options for extended hours at the Hillsborough Satellite Office.

3. The need for improved access to mental health services.

The Albert County Health and Wellness Centre will hire a parttime Social Worker to improve support to the community, including one-on-one support.

Wellness Support Group - The group, which is facilitated by Cynthia Stevens, RN, and Kirstin Shortt, meets once a month and is open to new people. Contact Cynthia at 866-6247 for details.

Grief Recovery Program – The 7-week program is a partnership between Hospice Greater Moncton and the Albert County Health and Wellness Centre. One group meets Monday evenings in Hillsborough and the other meets Wednesday evenings in Riverside-Albert. Each group is open to new people. The program will be repeated in the spring of 2018. For more information, contact Debbie Landry-Jaillet, Hospice Community Coordinator at 383-2404 or volunteer@hospicegm.ca.

Living Life to the Full - The 8-week program was a partnership between the Albert County Health and Wellness Centre and the Canadian Mental Health Association. The 2017 program was well attended with 13 people receiving a certificate of completion. Another program on anxiety and depression will be offered in the spring of 2018. For more information, contact Denise Miller at denise.miller@gnb.ca.

4. An insufficient amount of safe, affordable housing options in the community.

A sub-committee has been meeting regularly since June 2017 and is currently preparing to conduct a full housing needs assessment for our area. This will help identify the specific needs that exist, project what will be needed in the future, and support housing/apartment development in the area. The assessment will be conducted in early 2018 once funding can be secured. More details will be released as they are available.



5. The need for improved supports in the community for young families that are struggling and experiencing difficulties.

No specific updates at this time.

6. The need for improved collaboration between the municipalities in the area, and between municipalities and health and wellness professionals in the community.

Leadership from each municipality has met with Health Centre staff and have established a closer working relationship. They are currently working together and collaborating with other working groups.

7. Food insecurity in the community.

Foods of the Fundy Valley, through its Community Food Smart program and farmers' market, and the Shepody Food Bank are continuing their work to improve food security in our area. The Moncton area Public Health Office has voiced interest in supporting what is hap-

pening and will work with the groups in its capacity.

8. The need for additional programs and services in the community to allow seniors to become more engaged, connected and mobile.

No specific updates at this time (however, see number 10 below).

9. The need to evaluate the current function of the Albert County Health and Wellness Centre and strategize on how to move forward with the original vision of the community health centre (CHC) model of care.

Changes have started with the Health Centre's hours of operation in Riverside-Albert. The hours are now Monday to Thursday from 7am to 4:30pm and Friday from 8am to 4:30pm. This change has presented the option for providing evening access and offering more community programs. For details, call 882-3100.

10. Transportation issues in the community that impact health.

Tele-Drive is in its 5th year of operation (see description on page 12). It is organizing social outings, such as a tour of the

"fall colours." Free rides to the grocery store in Hillsborough are available every Monday to anyone who wishes to participate; you do not need to have used Tele-Drive services before. Tele-Drive is pleased to be providing mobility rides with the partnership of Forest Dale Home and their mobility van. For more information or to book a ride, call Kim Beers at 875-1190.

Protecting the Shoreline of Alma Beach

he Government of Canada is pleased to announce \$8.2M in funding to protect the shoreline along Highway 114. To enhance the experience of visitors, a new, longer boardwalk will be built near the southeast entrance of Fundy National Park. The section of Highway 114 along the Alma Beach area has seen frequent and repeated damage due to wave action and erosion during storm events which is attributed to a rise in sea levels due to climate change. The investment will fund important work to prevent further shoreline erosion and protect the important traffic corridor between Alma and Fundy National Park.

Also, a new, longer boardwalk will be built to provide visitors with a better way to experience Fundy's giant tides and the iconic Alma Wharf. The new boardwalk will be connected to the existing one and will include new observation platforms with access to the beach. Additionally, new trees and marram grass will be planted along the beach to improve ecological integrity and reduce the impacts of shoreline erosion. The new boardwalk will provide visitors with remarkable access to the park, while keeping them away from sensitive ecological zones along the shoreline.


Quick Facts

- · Fundy National Park welcomed more than 350,000 visitors and hosted more than 50,000 campsite nights during Canada 150 while also hosting many exciting special events and activities. Visitation in 2017 increased approximately 20% from the previous year.
- Fundy National Park encompasses 20 kilometres of dramatic shoreline along the Bay of Fundy, famous for having the world's highest tides. More than 100 kilometres of hiking and biking trails ribbon through 206 square kilometres of Acadian forest leading to thundering waterfalls, freshwater lakes and scenic river valleys.


Fundy Flashbacks



fter 45 weeks, the Ace of Spades was cap-Atured October 27th by Dana Butland of Riverside-Albert. His ticket draw earned \$1388, and the Jackpot was \$23.178 for a total win of \$24,566. A win such as this, or last year's big win, is life changing for those few lucky folks. We hope that the Friday night gatherings of friends, old and new, sharing a delicious meal prepared by Stephen Land and a beverage, and playing cards or dice, or talking, is also valuable. We think the winters are long and the warmth of the Fundy Curling Club provides a social event each week with the possibility of winning a bit of money and knowing that any money spent stays in our communities.

With Chase the Ace, the Chipoudy Communities Revitalization Committee (CCRC) funded projects including the installation of two wash-

rooms in the basement of the Riverside Consolidated School. This is the first step in establishing a Lifelong Learning Centre for preschoolers to seniors. East Coast Kids—Riverside-Albert has been in operation since June



2017, and Adult Education classes have been held since fall 2016. There are plans for more and different classes, as well as partnership projects with other community organizations.

In October, CCRC presented Nature Conservancy Canada with a cheque for \$6000 towards the cost of saving a rare forest and protecting the water supply of saving a rare forest. CCRC recognizes the importance of having an adequate and consistent water supply for the people of Riverside-Albert, and the vital role a water supply plays in economic development of the area.

CCRC has awarded bursaries and sponsorships for community events and people including Shepody Days Flea Market and Kayak Races, BACH golf tournament, RCS Memorial Garden, White Hills Pony Club and more.

The annual Christmas market is held at the historic Riverside Consolidated School on Dec. 2nd, 9am to 4pm. More than 40 tables will be filled with baking, crafts, home businesses, charitable organizations and more: all vendors are your neighbours from our county. The Biggest Bang for Your Christmas Buck

 \bigwedge hen the air is crisp, the leaves have fallen, and geese gather themselves for vearly their trip south, thoughts turn toward upcoming special days: Halloween, Remembrance Day, and then Christmas! Christmas is a widely celebrated event where family and community traditions blend in harmony. School concerts, special dinners, holiday parties, music events, charity donations, and travel plans loom over many of us by mid-November, and before we know it we are knee deep in coloured lights, festive ribbon, and list upon list of things to do, places to go, and stuff to buy.

Recent studies show that the average Canadian spends somewhere between \$1500 and \$1800 on Christmas, with around \$900 of that on gifts. This is no small amount! Gifts, travel and meals make up the majority of that spending and while it can be fun and exciting, for many the financial strain is also a huge consideration. And

so, we ask the question: "How can I get the biggest bang for every dollar I spend this holiday season?"

The answer may surprise you! Studies and experience tells us that the best way to make your money make a lasting impact, the way to get the biggest bang for your buck, is to buy local.

In Albert County, one of our greatest sources of income is in tourism, so let's use it as an example. Tourism infuses our local economy with money during a relatively short period; from tourists renting rooms to government funding for attractions, our county becomes a hub of activity by the start of July. It is then up to us as a greater community to keep driving our local economy forward so we can see the full effect of these dollars.

Economic stimulus, or in other words, the financial growth, of our county is dependent on how much of that money remains in it after the tourist season ends. Buying lo-



cal helps ensure that the money we bring into our economy stavs there.

Buying local creates more local wealth, which creates more local jobs, which increases demand, which advances wages, and the cycle continues. This is because independent, locally owned businesses recirculate more money back into the community.

A study showed that major chain retailers only put 13% of their revenue back into their while community. locally owned business redistribute 48% of their revenue directly back into their community so think, almost fifty cents of every dollar we spend at a local store comes back into our community in some way, compared to thirteen cents from the big box chains. This difference is enough to pay salaries, open more business, spend more money, and provide financial opportunities for your neighbors, family members, even yourself!

Another researcher figured out that twice the money stayed in the community when people buy local — that means your purchase is twice as effective in keeping our local communities alive and prosperous! Now that is major bang for vour buck!

Putting all of this new information together, simple math tells us something interesting:

The population of rural Albert County is around 4500 people. That means if we spend an average of \$1500 per person on the Christmas holidays, around 6.7 million dollars is spent by rural Albert County alone!

If only half of us spent half of our purchases on local goods (such as food, gifts, and even gas), we would add 1.6 million dollars to our local economy.

If all of us spent half of our purchases on local goods, we would add around 3.5 million dollars to our local economy.

So, what would you do with 3 million dollars? Talk about a major impact!
