During the 1800s, local agricultural societies were developing in rural communities throughout Canada and so were the annual agricultural fairs, which aimed to promote rural development. Such was the case in Albert County; the early fairs were organized by the agricultural society of each community and devoted to the exhibition of livestock and agricultural products. These annual one-day fairs in October were exciting social events in the communities of Albert, Harvey, Hopewell Hill, Hillsborough and Coverdale.

"Albert County Ex" cont. from p. 1

In 1913, the Albert Agricultural Society #133 was reorganized and the society's annual fair became a three-day exhibition, the Albert County Exhibition.

The following newspaper article was published on October 15, 1913, in the Albert Journal, the weekly Hillsborough newspaper of the time.

Very Successful Fair at Albert

The three days' exhibition of the newly organized Albert Agricultural Society opened Thursday, October 9, at Albert under favorable auspices. The weather was ideal and a fair sized crowd was present. The horses, with the exception of the roadsters, were shown Thursday and the exhibit was an exceedingly fine one and received great praise from the judge, Mr. C. W. Bell, who said that he had not seen the equal of the horse show at any of the fairs in the province, not excepting the provincial exhibition.



The agricultural and dairy products, fruit, and handiwork were on display in Oulton Hall and during the day visitors enjoyed the music furnished by the orchestra composed of J.H. Berrie, coronetist, Albert McLaughlin, violinist and Miss Marie Erb, pianist of Hillsborough. There was also a nice exhibit of sewing and drawing by the scholars of the Riverside Consolidated School. Among the features on Saturday of the Albert Fair in which most interest was taken were the exhibition of ladies' and gentlemen's driving rigs. These paraded at the Station square and made an attraction that held the attention of a large gathering. A good deal of interest was taken in the hauling competition in which the team owned by Alden Smith of Hopewell Hill took first prize.

The exhibition closed with a largely attended meeting in Oulton Hall on Saturday evening. From seven to eight p.m., a musical programme was given by the orchestra, and musical selections furnished by a large choir.

Infrastructure upgrades in Albert County

Alma: Over the next two years, the Alma harbour will be repaired. According to a press release from the government, the project involves "the reconstruction of breakwaters, which will provide safer navigation for harbour users sailing to and from their fishing grounds, and protect existing facilities at the harbour. Reconstruction will begin this year and is scheduled to be completed by December 2019. There are approximately 20 homeport vessels at the Alma harbour, and landings are primarily lobster and sea scallop. 2016 landings represented 800 metric tonnes, valued at approximately \$7.8 million. Approximately \$7.2 million has been invested at this harbour since 2015."

Hillsborough: The Hillsborough Arena will soon be upgraded. According to a press release from the Government of Canada on August 8, 2018, "the Hillsborough Arena is approximately 40 years old and in need of significant upgrades," including a new ice refrigeration system; new rink boards, glass, and netting; a new roof; and general electrical upgrades. "The governments of Canada and New Brunswick are each contributing over \$500,000, to this project through the Small Communities Fund, representing two-thirds of the estimated \$1.5 million total project cost."

Riverside-Albert Two water sampling stations will be installed in the municipal water system in Riverside-Albert. The federal government is funding up to 50 percent of project costs—over \$11,000. The provincial government is providing up to 25 percent—over \$5,000, and the Village of Riverside-Albert will provide the balance of the funding.

have a few, very fond and distinct memories of my summers as a child. Some of the clearest are of camping alone in my backyard. I would set up my pup tent under a tree in a corner facing away from the house (to further the illusion that I was in some exotic and wild location). Or my father would, after some convincing, open up the Coleman camper that we took on family vacations and I would drag in books, blankets, toys, games and snacks from the house. I staved out there for days sometimes. When I got hungry, I went in the house for meals. When I needed company, it was only a few steps away. When I needed the facilities, there they were. All the convenience of living at home but I had my own private, secluded and cozy place far away from the hustle and the bustle of my everyday 10-year-old life.

Flash forward 35 years and I realize that what I was doing now has a name. I may have actually invented "Glamping."

This trendy new accommodation and vacation experience, a mash-up of glamour and camping, meets all the needs of experienced outdoor vacationers but leaves no convenience forgotten. It's a catchy name for a suddenly stylish activity that has no official rules. The claim to the true history of Glamping is, in fact, still up for grabs. One wonders who coined the phrase first and marvels at the fact that aren't going **Famping** (fancy+camping) or Corting (fort+camping). **Despite** murky origins, Glamping's present day popularity is clear and undeniable.

Glamping units (pods, platforms, treehouses etc.) are popping up everywhere like juicy little mushrooms deep in forests by the side of the road and in the middle of fields in national parks and private backyards alike.

The common thread is this, Glamping is a getaway with benefits. All the things you love about camping without having to poop in the woods.

Albert County has poked and prodded Glamping to see exactly what it's all about and has now embraced the idea like it embraces all good ideas, slowly with great deliberation and then with wide open arms and a great deal of local flair.

Broadleaf Ranch, a cornerstone of the area's accommodation and tourism industry, has built six themed Glamping units high up in the Shepody Hills. These units (2 Lighthouses, 2 Chuckwagons and 2 Covered Bridges) are like grown-up

playhouses with the best imaginable views of the county and the Bay of Fundy. With three-piece bathrooms, kitchenettes, big, soft beds and fire pits, they have everything that a family, a couple or a lone voyager could possibly need to get away from the madding crowds and breathe in the balm of silence and solitude. They are perfect jumping off points to take in all that Albert County has to offer. A tiny base camp, if you will.

Fundy National Park has hopped on board the Glamping wagon too. They have embraced a wide swath of accommodations that the new and loosely defined genre allows: OTENTiks, The Goutte d'Ô, Yurts and Rustic Cabins—a carnival of experiences to have. All with various amenities for travellers that dream of being off-thegrid gypsies, if only for a few hours.

Private Glamping experiences in Albert county range from huge tents on handmade wooden platforms overlooking Fundy Bay in New Horton to "Hobbit look" pods that "provide a comfortable, hassle-free camping experience". Google "Albert county glamping" and you'll find veritable villages of options.

More and more travellers are looking for experiential vacations. Not just SEEING but DOING. We travel the world looking to tap into new sensations and awaken the feelings of joy, safety, comfort and wonder that have been lost in the frenzy or the mundanity of our lives.

Glamping invites travellers to a world without noise and banal banter, where there is probably no Wi-Fi or satellite TV. When the day is done, and you have hiked and visited and seen and experienced all the things, Glamping lets

Fundy Roads in the last millennium: Doin' that Voodoo Thang

Meanwhile, below Chignecto, an existing iron waterline is coming through our job, not missing us as previously thought. Workers found where it disappears into the ground—but that's about all. Surveyors need to find and stake the underground pipe position so it doesn't get destroyed in 'construction.'

Being the ever apparent and likely candidate to do weird stuff, I was first up. I confessed I had no idea how to go about this, but would give it a try if someone could 'learn me up.'

Next day I apprenticed with the 'Master' up on the job. He was younger than me, clean cut, not at all the gnarled old wizard with a pointy hat and staff I had been expecting.

Just hold them out like pistols in front of ya; keep the tips up so they are unstable, swaying a bit when you walk forward, keeping everything level. Move at right angles toward the pipe and watch what happens, if you believe..."

Nervously moving forward, feeling ahead with my boots in the brush to stay level like he told me, I cautiously approached where we thought the buried pipe should be. The coat hangers slowly flopped forward and crossed in front of me as I came over top of the buried pipe.

"You got the 'Power.' Don't ask me how it works."

The iron line full of moving water was an easy target. I graduated to finding culverts, plastic pipe, septic tank trays and electrical cable. But I can't dowse well water like Auntie over in Harvey. Now that's witchcraft nonsense... far as I'm concerned.


