The Thibodeau family had 21 children. I am from Charles Thibodeau, one of their youngest sons. Our strain settled on the Bayou Teche in Parks, Louisiana. My father was Wilfred Peck, who lived to be 104 years old in Corpus Christi, Texas, where I was born. Now I feel so closely kin to my ancestor grandfather and all of his descendants. There are over 20,000 descendants from Thibodeau."

## Flu Campaign

Getting immunized each year with the influenza vaccine (flu shot) is the best way to protect against influenza infection (flu), a serious and sometimes fatal disease. The flu shot is available at the Albert County Community Health Centre, Albert County Pharmacy in Riverside-Albert, and other pharmacies and health centres.

The Albert County Community Health Centre's Flu Campaign runs from Nov. 4th-8th, 9am-4pm at the centre in Riverside-Albert. Check the list at the left for the times at other locations. Just drop in; no appointment is necessary. If you miss those dates, you can get the flu shot later. The vaccine is available for free for most New Brunswick residents (www.Connecting AlbertCounty.org/wellness/flu-shot-time).

## Early Churches of Elgin By Idella Steeves/Lazar

Imagine yourself looking over the Elgin area in the early 1800s—unbroken forest, mountains and rolling hills with valleys in between rivers, streams and falls. The land provides game for food, rivers for fish, and trees for wood to build and perhaps later for a mill, with a canopy of beautiful colours in the fall. It is the land of opportunity! Many days and weeks of labour? Yes, but owning a piece of land is a dream come true for the hardy early settlers.

People arrive in the early 1800s full of optimism and hope. Surnames like Geldart, Steeves, Smith, Mitton, Jonah, Hayward, Gray, Colpitts, Wilson, Hopper, Gowland, Prosser and Bleakney are familiar today.

The area is gradually being settled but there is no church or even a travelling preacher. In 1835, Rev. Joseph Crandall, pastor of Salisbury Baptist Church, works tirelessly to organize the Elgin United Baptist Church. At first, meetings are held in homes or a school, if there is one. The first church is built near the middle of the Old Elgin Cemetery with the first school located nearby.

By the early 1840s, congregational meetings are held in the community not yet called Elgin. Deacon Robert Smith desires to build a "meeting house" and, largely due to his efforts, one is dedicated (the First Elgin Baptist Church). For some people, a church is probably low in their priorities They are occupied with building their first home, raising families, gathering fuel for the winter, clearing land to grow food, hunting game and fishing. The settlers soon see business opportunities for stores, grist mills, sawmills, and maple sugar-making enterprises.

The original First Elgin Baptist Church is a log cabin located by the Old Graveyard in 1839. In 1870, a new church is built at the current site, established by Rev. Joseph Crandall. What great satisfaction this must be for that relentless preacher! But, alas, on April 28, 1937, the church burns to the ground. It was being warmed up for the funeral of Addie Babcock. An overheated furnace pipe led to the fire, which also takes the spectacular residence across the road (the home built by Mrs. Isaacs in 1895 for \$3000 and one of the first to have indoor plumbing with gravity-fed water). Unfazed, the community comes together and

two weeks later the basement is near completion. The new building is dedicated in July 1938, at a cost of \$3500-\$4000, with generous help from people in the community and surrounding area.

In the 1850s, the Gowland Mountain, Hillside, and Methodist Churches are built. The Goshen Baptist Church is built in 1860. It is lit by kerosene lamps and the pews have doors that open outward. It is common to "sell" the pews to meet the church debt. You own a pew and always sit there. In *Sugaring Off,* Mae Short writes that the ministers of the third Elgin Baptist Church would spend the night in a spare room of a parishioner. When there was no heat, the water pitcher would freeze overnight.

Back in those days of sparse settlements and often no neighbours close by, attending church was also a social occasion to catch up on the local happenings, whose baby was born, who was married, who passed away, and did so-and-so recover from illness or accident? You can understand how a church could be called a meeting house. Once a week, church gave you an opportunity to see your neighbours. At the Goshen Baptist Church a shed was built to accommodate horses. Many preachers must have listened for the first sound of the bells on the horse's harness, knowing they would have someone to preach to.

Seniors are learning more about communities within Westmorland and Albert Counties, as well as learning skills. The third event in the series took place on September 25th when two buses of seniors travelling from Albert County and the Salisbury region arrived in Dorchester to begin a fun day of learning.

Members of the Dorchester Volunteer Firefighters helped prepare a delicious lunch of chicken fricot, rolls (baked by the newly opened Cape Road Baking Company) and berry crumble. The group was joined at lunch by Nicole Dubé, the Mi'kmaq Cultural Coordinator at Fort Folly, who shared a traditional Mi'kmaq blessing of the food.

After lunch, the seniors went to Fort Folly to learn about medicinal herbs and plants used by the indigenous community. One group was treated to an informational walk on a medicinal trail learning about the uses of plants. The walk ended with an interesting visit to the sweat lodge (shown above) where the group learned about its significance and use. The other group enjoyed a tour of the Keillor House Museum.





- Appliances (limit of 1/type): Fridge, stove, freezer, dryer, BBQ, etc.
- Electronic Waste: TVs, computer monitors, hard drives, DVD players, gaming consoles, etc.
- Furniture
- Small Household Machinery (must be emptied of gas and oil)
- Construction, Demolition and Renovation Waste
- Household Hazardous Waste: Batteries, cooking oil, aerosols, paint, light bulbs, fertilizers, chemicals, CFL bulbs, propane tanks, etc.
- Car and truck tires (maximum of 20" diameter, limit 8 per customer)
- Brush/Branches and yard waste
- Ashes
- Glass
- Cardboard and paper
- · Cooking oil
- Metal

\*No car parts, gas tanks, residential oil tanks, regular curbside waste or commercial waste
