

The family doctors and nurse practitioner at the clinic continue to accept new patients. Call 882-3100 to make an appointment or learn about the following services.

Really good jobs always eluded me. More education might have helped, I don't really know.

Now, the house is quiet. Peace and tranquility reign, but not for long. Soon, Mariann decides she wants to go back and finish high school. She thinks I should, too. At first, I balk at the idea. In 67 years I have had a lifetime of "education" out in the real world. Why should I go back to high school now?

A year later, I did show up, hat in hand, asking to be given a chance to pick up my lost high school years at the little Riverside -Albert Adult Education facility where Mariann was attending. I was pleased to learn my EI would be extended to help me do this.

Full of sweetness and smiles, Eleanor Mollins, our teacher, welcomed me and got me tested and busy at my lessons. The school was a small room located in the basement of the local wellness clinic. "Miss Ellie," as I called her, was a wealth of information as I wrestled with those awkwardly elusive subjects: science, social studies and algebra.

For ten weeks I applied myself diligently, including doing other subjects and homework, and I truly struggled with "ratios" and "quadratic equations." Finally, it was exam time. Here, I was in for a bit of a shock. When in high school more than fifty years ago, everything was cursive and you had to be able to spell. Now, all we do is shade in some small circles on computer paper that will ap-

parently deliver up the information needed to analyze and decided whether we've learned anything or not. As I write this, I'm still waiting for my results to come through.

But, you know, it really doesn't matter how high my marks turn out. I thoroughly enjoyed going back to school, making new friends, and gaining a better understanding of the world around me. I expect my GED diploma will help me stay in the working world a little longer. For that I will al-

ways be grateful. Besides, Mariann and I will be the first senior couple to graduate from "Miss Ellie's" school! Perhaps you *can* teach an old dog new tricks.

According to Jim, the couple went back to school "largely to encourage others." Mariann started the program first but had to stop for a year due to a stroke. Once Mariann was well enough to return to the classes, Jim went with her.

Both Jim and Mariann graduated in Spring 2016 and had the exactly the same grade (an average of 77% for all their courses).

Jim says he even got a job out the program. After their graduation was publicized, Jim received a call that eventually led to a new job—Pastor of the Albert Mines Baptist Church.

The adult learning program is a partnership between the Albert County Health & Wellness Centre (which provides the classroom) and the South East Regional Adult Learning Board. ALBERT COUNTY HERITAGE FAIR

The Albert County Museum was bustling with activity and excitement on May 11th with Anglophone East students participating in the 2016 Regional Heritage Fair. This year, the Honourable Jocelyne Roy-Vienneau, Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, and His Honour Mr. Ronald Vienneau viewed the heritage projects and participated in the Awards Ceremony.

Students from five middle schools proudly displayed their creative and innovative heritage projects of varied themes and project categories.

Judges interviewed the students and assessed projects based on specific evaluation criteria for the special juried awards, as well as other prizes.

But, the day included much more than the judging. The students learned about the operation of the museum's unique outdoor cob oven. They learned how to make their own small pizza and bake it in the cob oven. Eating their delicious wood-fired pizzas definitely made this activity a hit! Then, during a slide presentation and a short drama about Heinrich and Regina Stief, the students learned about the history of the Steeves family who immigrated to Albert County 250 years ago. A tour of the museum concluded the enrichment activities.

The grand finale of the day was the Awards Ceremony in the Courthouse at the museum. The Lieutenant-Governor, who is the Honourary Patron of the Provincial Heritage Fair program, delivered encouraging words of praise and congratulations to all the students for their impressive projects.

The judges selected Alyssa Foster's (Riverview East) project, "Thomas Francis Collins," to represent ASD-E at the Provincial Heritage Fair.

During the Awards Ceremony, every student was presented with either a juried award trophy, an award plaque or a special prize. This was definitely an historical day at the Albert County Museum.

Danny A. Jonah is a lifetime resident of Albert County. After graduating from Caledonia High in 1967, he started a career in accounting with the Bank of Nova Scotia in Hillsborough. He worked in accounting until becoming the first full-time Administrator/Clerk with the Village of Hillsborough in 1982, where he worked until 2007. After a year of full retirement, he accepted a part -time position with Collins Lobster in Alma where he is responsible for accounting and provincial and federal policies. A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE STEEVES FAMILY NAME

Heinrich and Regina Stief left their homeland Germany in 1749 and settled in Pennsylvania. From there, in 1766, they and a small group of fellow settlers migrated to the rough terrain around New Brunswick's Petitcodiac River.

Faced with starvation, frigid winters, and abandonment by their sponsors--among them Benjamin Franklin--the settlers defied the odds by not only surviving, but prospering. The Stief family finally settled in what is now Hillsborough, Albert County, New Brunswick.

In the *Return of Inhabitants of the Township of Hills-borough* taken in 1783, the Stief name disappeared and was anglicized into Steeve. The Walling Map of 1862 records the name as Steves and after a couple other subsequent 'clerical errors,' the name has become Steeves. Steeves descendants now number upwards of 300,000 worldwide.
