While it seemed that the volunteer driver service provided by Tele-Drive in Albert County was going to disappear following a press release by the Board of Directors in late June, the service will continue. The Tele-Drive Board of Directors is working closely with

Rural Rides and WA Transpo to ensure clients in the region continue to have access to affordable transportation. All existing clients and drivers have been contacted and advised to call 962-3073 to book future rides.

Tele-Drive has been partnering with Rural Rides and the Volunteer Centre of Southeastern NB over the past couple of years to expand services throughout Albert and Westmorland Counties under the banner of WA Transpo. There have been some challenges and growing pains in the process, but the intent of these programs is to continue to deliver this much needed service in their communities. The service will continue in Albert County because of the teamwork of these programs.

A volunteer driver service is an essential element to the life of rural residents. They provide much needed transportation to medical appointments and access to other life needs. They also connect people to their communities and, in doing so, help to reduce isolation.

There is an ongoing need for volunteer drivers. If you have a few hours a month that you can volunteer to help your neighbours get where they need to go, please call Kelly Taylor at 962-3073.

## New Shorebird Discovery Centre Pictures and text by Janet Wallace

The mudflats at Mary's Point are filled with visitors every summer. Millions of shorebirds arrive at the Upper Bay of Fundy from late July to early September. The flocks of tens of thousands of birds attract their own visitors—humans who come to watch the spectacle and peregrine falcons which come to prey upon the shorebirds. And spectacular it is, with thousands of birds winding their way through the sky, twisting and twirling as though the massive flock is one entity.

In their layover in the midst of their annual journey from the Canadian Arctic to South America, semipalmated sandpipers refuel by consuming invertebrates, particularly 'mud shrimp' (Corophium volutator). The semipalmated sandpipers are joined by other shorebirds, including semipalmated plovers, black-bellied plovers, sanderlings and others.

The best time to see large flocks of birds is from two hours before



high tide to two hours after high tide. At other times, the birds are spread out on the flats as they forage for mud shrimp. The peak of the migration seems to be getting later each year; last year, the highest number of birds was in the third week of August. If you miss the sight of the flocks, you can get a sense of the magnitude of this phenomenon by watching the videos and seeing the pictures

at the new Shorebird Discovery Centre at 415 Mary's Point Road, Harvey. The centre provides an opportunity to learn more about the birds and in late July and August, there will be interpretative programs for children and adults.

The Shorebird Discovery Centre was developed with funding from the federal Connecting Canadians to Nature Initiative. The Centre is part of the Shepody National Wildlife Area, which encompasses the Germantown Marsh, Mary's Point, and New Horton sections that are situated on and adjacent to Chignecto and Shepody Bays.

Brooklyn, the 17-year-old daughter of Annick Robichaud Butland and Cory Wilkins, represented New Brunswick and won! Let's talk with Brooklyn about her pageant experience.

## How did you become interested in entering pageants?

My interest in pageants started with the Albert County Exhibition (ACE) Queen pageant in 2016. I wasn't sure about whether or not I was going to enter since I didn't think that I belonged in pageants, but Dawne McLean convinced me otherwise. I entered the pageant and, much to my surprise, won! From there I was invited to enter

the Miss Teen Atlantic Canada pageant. Similar to ACE, I wasn't going to enter. I had no confidence in myself whatsoever and I was certain that I would only embarrass myself in front of everyone. But, throughout my weekend at the fair that year, I had numerous people (especially Kelly Power and Debbie Steeves) encourage me to just go for it. Their faith in me pushed me to take the next step into the big leagues.

## How did you choose which pageants you wished to enter?

When I first started out, I wasn't aware of the pageant community in New Brunswick at all! So basically, if I was invited, I would enter. But as my knowledge grew, I found that I look for three things: (1) A system that gives me a platform to advocate for things such as mental illnesses or women's empowerment and where the title will be taken seriously; (2) The title-holder is chosen primarily for her personality and community work; (3) It has good reviews from delegates and social media.

# How have you volunteered in the community and supported charity organizations?

As a titleholder, community involvement is a must. Some memorable events include the SPCA Paws Walk, the Run for Women (in support of the Beausejour Family Crisis Centre), Phar Dans La Nuit (Night of the Arts, based around mental health), and the Monster Trot (in support of the Atlantic Wellness Community Centre). I've visited the seniors at Forest Dale,

read at Santa in the Park in Riverside-Albert, and volunteered at the Albert County Winter Carnival. As Miss Teen New Brunswick, I helped backstage at the Miss Teen Atlantic Pageant. I judged the first Little Miss Atlantic Pageant and coemceed the Diamond Night they held in support of their scholarship fund.

# What positive or rewarding experiences have you enjoyed during the pageants?

The sisterhood. It took me a little while to adapt to the term, but there really is no other word to describe the bond you form with these girls. It is remarkable. The amount of support and encouragement we give one another is overwhelming and within just a few days we feel like we've known each other for years. From inside jokes to vulnerable moments to simply being there when the stress of pageant week becomes too much, these memorable moments truly define this word.

# What is the greatest impact that the pageant experience has made in your life?

Participating in pageants has shaped who I am. It's made me more confident in both my appearance and in being able to just be myself. It's given me the courage and ambition to speak about things that I am passionate about and to follow my dreams. Pageants have shown me that I am loved, and that beauty is found on the inside where it shines brighter than any star in the galaxy.

## Accepted to University! Now what? By Trisha Leaver

Having that university or college letter in hand comes with a lot of excitement, and maybe a bit of relief. But it can also lead to worry and concern about how to pay for this long-anticipated post-secondary education. How do you figure out how much you need? What are the options if you aren't eligible for or don't want a government loan? How does having a part-time job affect how much you borrow? Should you have a chequing or savings account? Is having a credit card a good or bad idea?

Having a better understanding of your finances and having a plan of action can alleviate the pressure that comes with having so many questions. Read on to feel secure and informed about your decisions.

#### How will you pay for it?

There are a lot of numbers to crunch when it comes to understanding your finances for school and mak-

ing smart decisions. Start with calculating your school expenses for the upcoming year. This includes program tuition and also all other costs associated with attending school, such as books, cost of living, and transportation. Next, look at the amount of money you can contribute. This includes personal savings, parental contributions, and any money you'll earn if you plan to work and earn a paycheque during the school year. Subtract the total of your income and savings from your calculated school expense to find how much more you need.

If you need to borrow to finance your education, as many students do, government loans are helpful but are not always enough. Also, not all students are eligible. Other options include a student line of credit or student loan. As long as you're a full-time student, you don't need to pay the monthly interest and payments until six months after leaving your educational institution.

#### What else do I need?

- 1. Make a budget and stick to it. This will help you manage your monthly expenses without overspending and running out of money before the end of the school year.
- 2. Have a chequing account... or two. You'll need this for expenses and to pay your rent and utilities if living off campus. Some student chequing accounts often offer great benefits that regular chequing accounts lack. You can use a banking app on your phone for all of your day-to-day banking, including depositing a cheque by taking a photo and email money transfers.

Consider having two chequing accounts. The first should contain all your savings and income for the year from which your tuition and accommodation-related expenses should be paid. Use the second account for expenses over which you have more controlr such as transportation, groceries and fun money. You will have control of staying on budget if you overspend on fun by making different purchasing decisions for the rest of the month (read: lots of instant noodles for the rest of the month!).

3. Apply for and have a student credit card **if** you use it only for emergency purposes or for major purchases of items you **need**. A credit card can help you establish credit while you're attending school. If you keep your credit in good standing, this can help with your student loan approval next year, and other credit needs in the future. If you make your payments on time, you'll never pay interest. If you're worried about ending up with a credit card bill you can't pay, apply for a low credit limit. Be sure to look for a credit card that offers the best rate and with no annual fee.

## Chipoudie Monument By Wilfred Savoie

A very important historic event will happen in Riverside-Albert on August 16th. For the last three years, a joint committee cochaired by Wilfred Savoie and Riverside-Albert Mayor Jim Campbell has been working diligently to complete the Chipoudie Monument project. The Monument has been created to honour the Acadian families who once inhabited the region known as Chipoudie, the area along the Shepody Bay coast from Lower Cape, Shepody, Hopewell Hill and the area in and around Riverside-Albert from 1700 to 1755.

Due to its historical importance, the joint committee has organized an official unveiling and has extended an invitation to the Acadian Diaspora throughout the world. The unveiling ceremony will be held at 10:30am Friday, August 16th during the Acadian World Congress at McClelan Park (Rte 114/King St. opposite Maple St. in Riverside-Albert).

The special guest speaker will be former Premier of New Brunswick, Mr. Frank McKenna, who has been a great supporter of the project from the very beginning. He will address the gathering and

unveil the information panel erected next to the monument.

The monument will be unveiled by the committee's cochairs, Wilfred Savoie and Mayor Jim Campbell. The unveiling ceremony will include the blessing of the monument and remarks from Fundy Royal MP Alaina Lockhart, Albert MLA Hon. Mike Holland and Dieppe MLA Hon. Roger Melanson. Fol-

lowing the ceremony, everyone is invited for a social gathering at the exhibition grounds in Riverside-Albert to be entertained with live music and to enjoy various foods. Dr. Stephen White, a well-known genealogist from the University of Moncton, will deliver a presentation (in English) on the genealogy and history of the Acadian families who once lived in the area.



the province how both language groups can work together to accomplish great things.

## **Museum Commemorated Joyous Celebrations of 1919**

July 1st may have been a rainy damp day throughout our region this year, but the spirit of celebration was far from damp at the Albert County Museum for the annual Canada Day & RB Bennett Day event. This year commemorated the "joyous return" of the Albert County WWI soldiers in 1919, as well as the fact that Albert County won the provincial 1919 Victory Loans Campaign competition.

At noon, everyone enjoyed a buffet BBQ served in the Community Hall followed by the singing of "O Canada" and musical entertainment by Fundy Ceilidh.

Stuart Liptay, President of the Albert County Historical Society (ACHS), officially welcomed everyone and shared the news of an important donation. The museum recently received the WWI British War Medal that had been awarded posthumously to the 15-year-

old boy soldier, Private Clifford Robinson Oulton from Bridgedale, who was killed on Nov. 1, 1917 at the Battle at Passchendaele. Sadly, Private Oulton was one of hundreds of underage boy soldiers who never returned from the Great War. The donation of Private Oulton's WWI British War Medal is greatly appreciated; it will be displayed in the County of Heroes exhibit.

Brent Wilson, historian and author of Family of Brothers: Soldiers of the 26th Battalion of New Brunswick, was the invited guest speaker. Brent showed WWI photos and talked about the activities of the soldiers in Europe after the war ended on Nov. 11, 1918 until they returned home in May 1919 on the ship SS Olympic. Brent also shared several personal stories from WWI letters written by Albert County soldiers (included in Family of Brothers).

Dawne McLean, ACHS VP, spoke briefly about her great uncle,

Hugh Wright who served in the 26th Battalion sailing from Saint

John on June 13, 1915 on the ship *Caledonia* for Europe. Hugh was 24 years old when he returned home in May 1919 to the Wright family farm in Shepody.

To celebrate the joyous return of the NB soldiers in 1919, Saint John held a two-day Soldiers' Joy event August 14-15th. Invitations were sent to all the NB soldiers who had served in the war, inviting them to come to Saint John with their families. Hugh travelled by train from Shepody to Saint John to participate in this joyous event. In the WWI County of Heroes exhibit at the Albert County Museum, his 1919 souvenir button with a printed ribbon is included in the wall shadow box with his other war memorabilia and photos. A photo of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales (the future King Edward VIII) is on the button. On the red ribbon, "Souvenir of H.R.H. Prince of Wales Maiden Visit to American Continent Entering at St. John, N.B. Aug. 15, 1919" is written in gold print. August


15th was "Prince Day" when the Prince of Wales arrived in Saint John, the first point of his Canadian tour.

In later years, Hugh was the lightkeeper on Grindstone Island from 1936-1950. On his first Dominion Day (now called Canada Day) on Grindstone Island, many community friends and family members went on a boat trip to the island to visit him. So, Dawne thought it was appropriate on Canada Day to show this signature list of 33 visitors to Grindstone Island on July 1, 1936...83 years ago.

President Liptay explained the historic background of Albert County's Victory Loans Campaign. As a way to raise funds to help with the financial debts of WWI, the New Brunswick government organized a 1919 Victory Loans Campaign competition among the provincial counties. The citizens of Albert County "dug deep" reaching a total amount of \$347,600 which more than tripled their set goal. Albert County won the competition! Not only was Albert County awarded the Prince of Wales honour flag for winning the 1919 Victory Loans Campaign competition, but the citizens of Albert County were also awarded the war trophy of the German 10.5cm K-14 field gun captured at Vimy Ridge.

The Victory Loans Campaign also held an important connection to Prime Minister RB Bennett because RB's brother, Captain Ronald Bennett of Hopewell Cape, was the chairman of the 1919 Albert County Victory Loans Campaign.

It was a pleasure to have RB Bennett's nephew, William Herridge of Toronto and his daughter Elizabeth attend the July 1st event at the museum again.



Mr. Herridge gave an informative talk about his uncle Ronald Bennett who had served overseas in the navy during WWI and had an impressive career. In 1933 Ronald and his wife acquired the property and stately home in Sackville known as Anchorage, where Prime Minister RB Bennett often visited. Tragically, Ronald Bennett and his wife, Elva, suffered the loss of their two sons, Major Edwin Ronald Bennett and Lieut. Henry Harrison Bennett. The brothers, both members of the Black Watch, were killed in action ten days apart during the invasion of Normandy, France in 1944. At the time of Captain Ronald Bennett's death in 1961, he left his sizable estate to Mount Allison University. Today, Anchorage House or the Bennett House is Mount Allison's Centre for Canadian Studies.

The July 1st event ended with everyone enjoying the celebration cake and ice cream!

It was definitely a rewarding and enjoyable day to have so many people attend the July 1st event and be interested in listening and learning more about the proud heritage and history of Albert County.

### PIT happens: Salmon's destiny discovered in a pile of droppings By Kat Hallett

In late spring of 2018, deep in the backcountry of Fundy National Park, a group of Resource Management Officers made a fishy discovery in a pile of animal scat (fecal matter).

Their day started just like any other, a quick morning meeting before grabbing a radio, hopping in the truck and heading out in the field. The crew was deploying temperature loggers in streams; these continuously monitor the water quality and help ensure the ecological integrity of Fundy National Park.

While hiking to the monitoring site, the team saw all the usual sights—lots of birds, towering spruce, and of course, animal scat. One interesting pile of scat, found in the forest high above the river valley, contained a little bit more than the typical 'ingredients' you would expect to find. A Passive Integrated Transponder (PIT) tag sat virtually unscathed amidst the



tangle of past meals in the culprit's fecal matter.

## Passive Integrated Transponders—through the looking glass

This small glass capsule, approximately 2 cm in length, caught the eye of the Resource Conservation team because PIT tags are used in the Fundy National Park Conservation and Restoration program

called Fundy Salmon Recovery. Each spring and fall the Fundy Resource Conservation team and its partners in Fundy Salmon Recovery insert tags in wild salmon. Biologists do this so they can follow the family history of the salmon, as well as track them as they mature to know when the fish return to their native rivers in Fundy National Park to spawn.

Neil Vinson, Resource Management Officer for Fundy National Park, did not hesitate to collect this capsule from the scat. This tag acts as a looking glass into the life of this endangered, wild Inner Bay of Fundy Atlantic salmon.

"Of course we had to take it with us," says Vinson. "We weren't out looking for salmon that day, so we didn't have the proper equipment with us to scan the PIT tag to investigate. Also, we wanted to know which kind of scat this was, but it was hard to tell since it looked fairly weathered."

#### **Guess who came for dinner?**

Once the tag was back at the office, a quick scan with the PIT tag reader revealed this fish's ID number, along with some information about its life. To identify the culprit that ate the salmon, a photo of the scat was sent to partners at the Maritime College of Forest Technology, who confirmed that it was indeed a coyote.

#### **Eulogy of Salmon #515176**

This particular salmon was first released to Fundy National Park waters as a fry in the spring of 2013. After growing in the wild for a year and a half, he was collected as a parr in the fall of 2014 and brought to a hatchery run by Fisheries and Oceans Canada outside of Fredericton, NB. By the spring of 2015, he was ready to be moved from freshwater to saltwater. He was later transported as a smolt to the World's First Wild Atlantic Salmon Marine Conservation Farm on Grand Manan Island, NB, where Cooke Aquaculture and the Atlantic Canada Fish Farmers Association grow wild Fundy Salmon Recovery smolts to maturity.

In September 2017, this salmon measured in at 67.5 cm long and weighed a healthy 3.67 kg; he was ready to return to the wild. On release day, October 12th 2017, this salmon was delivered by helicopter to Black Hole pool on the Upper Salmon River in Fundy National Park.

After this fish was released back to the wild, the details of its life become less clear. The PIT tag was found approximately three km upstream from the release site at Black Hole pool, and about one km into the woods west of the river. Did the fish make his way that far upstream looking for a suitable female to spawn with, or did our salmon snacker take this prey to a quiet place to eat in private? How long

did this salmon live in the river and was he able to spawn before he met his demise?

#### A needle in a haystack

The discovery of this PIT tag offered a fascinating opportunity to follow the life of a wild Inner Bay of Fundy Atlantic salmon, and speculate at some of the missing details that we may never know.

"It's amazing to think that I was part of the river crew that released this exact fish at Black Hole last fall, and seven months later we just happened upon this pile of scat and noticed part of the tag showing," recalls Vinson. "Fundy National Park is over 200 km<sup>2</sup>. It really does feel like we found a needle in a hay-stack."


